


Hi! I am Cherry! I am one of the girls who joined the New Zealand study tour! I felt very glad that I could go to NZ! I had a lot of fun.


Another difference between the two places is the pace of life. Spanish people always know how to relax and enjoy every day. For example, many of them would choose to

The study tour to Singapore has broadened my horizons as I have learntthe importance of being environmentally friendly.

On the second day of the trip, we visited Queenstown Secondary School which was extremely large. The comprehensive sports facilities caught my eye: one football court, two basketball courts, handball court. volleyball court and one gymnasium. The school did very well in environmental

protection. Two big fans were installed in the school hall instead of air-conditioners. Economically, replacing six air-conditioners with two big fans is very cost-effective. Not only can it save 100,000 Singapore dollars spent on electricity per month, but it can also solve the global warming problem.

On the third day, we went to Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve. I saw many plants which I had never seen before. The most interesting ones were the mangrove trees. They help solve the water pollution problem. Mangroves can also prevent flooding. Some other trees are planted in the wetland which can test out whether the water has been polluted or not, without using chemical tests.

There is a Chinese proverb that "it is better to travel ten thousand miles than to read ten thousand books". In the past, I couldn't understand it well until this journey of learning. Both Hong Kong and Singapore are metropolitan areas with limited natural resources. Hong Kong should learn from Singapore's green policies and try to do more to improve the environment.

Going to Singapore was a great learning experience. I have learned that Singapore is hot all year round, which I had never heard of before. I have also learned that Singapore has multi-cultures such as Indian and Chinese cultures.

In addition, I have learned how Singapore treats her water supply. Singapore uses multiple rivers to store up rain water. For example, Marina Barrage has gates so water inside can go out into the sea. NEWater is a company that uses advanced technology to change dirty water into ultra clean drinking water.

I went to a famous place called Gardens by the Bay. There is a big waterfall at the entrance to the Cloud Forest so you will feel the big spray from it. The temperature there is lower than 20 degrees Celsius. There is no airconditioning, but the place is cool because of the plants there. From that experience, I have learned that plants can replace air-conditioning in Hong Kong. They can save a lot of money and electricity, and reduce the air pollution.

This is the best experience I have ever had because I have learned a lot that I could not learn in the classroom.



Established goals:

- Understand the concept of cultural conservation
- Examine the policies of cultural conservation in the two cities.
- Assess the effectiveness of cultural conservation of a city
- Compare the differences between the cultural conservation of the two cities.
- Suggest ways to improve the cultural conservation practices in Hong Kong.

Learning Targets:




Career and life Planning: University Life in Taiwan
